## Family Devotional May 17th, 2020

*If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, and ask in faith. James 1: 5-6*

Let's sing about how we can talk to God at anytime and ask Him for anything!



SONG "When We Pray"



We are going to be looking at the book of James. It shows us how we can grow stronger in our faith. This week we will focus on turning to God and asking for His wisdom (knowledge) To become a strong and wise believer, we must trust God's plan, persevere, and obey the bible. We must also learn to ask Him to help us & trust that He will answer and provide for us. Sometimes it is hard to ask for help, but it is in asking that we are made strong. Read James 1 as a family and discuss these questions:

1. Who was James?
2. What are we supposed to do when we face trials?
3. What are we supposed to do when we lack knowledge or we don't know what to do?
4. How are we supposed to ask?

The Bible teaches us that when we lack wisdom (knowledge) we should ask God & trust that He is going to answer. Since He has all wisdom we want to ask Him first. I like to think of His answers as treasure He supplies. I use this acronym for **ASK: Always Seek Kingdom Treasure** to help me remember to seek God first. During this time of Covid-19 there have been trials we've faced and not understood. Discuss with your family how you've turned to God in this time. Share with each other specific questions you asked God and the wisdom He answered with. When you are finished talk about some other prayers you have asked God for and believed in faith that He would answer. Then get two envelopes and label them ask and answered. Write the things you have asked for and the things that God has answered, put them in the envelopes to remind you to ask and remember His faithfulness to answer us.
